You will choose your first-year papers – two Options papers and one Sources paper – in September.

There is no requirement to read any books in advance, but if you want to, then we list here some of the texts recommended for each of the Outline papers. Many of these will be available to you electronically through the University Library (<u>iDiscover.cam.ac.uk</u>) as soon as you are assigned a 'crs id', or university email address in September.

If you want to buy any of them, by far the best place to buy second-hand books online is bookfinder.com, which aggregates *all* of the online dealers, sorts them from lowest to highest price, and links to the dealer for purchase.
